- You receive this when you complete all requirements up through grade 12. Most jobs and educational programs require that you have this.
- 2. This degree comes after a Bachelor's degree and usually takes 2 years of full time college to complete. Many people are choosing to get this degree to give them a better chance of getting a higher paying job.
- 3. This degree comes after a Master's degree and usually takes 2-4 years of full time college to complete. This is also called a professional degree and it is required for people that want to be medical doctors, dentists, veterinarians as well as professors in 4 year colleges and universities. You may get this degree in most majors offering a four year degree and/or master's degree.
- 4. You receive this degree upon completion of a four year college program. Many jobs such as educators and other professional occupations require this degree as a minimum requirement.
- 5. You receive this type of degree after completing a two year college program. Many people also choose to transfer their credits to attend a 4 year college or university after receiving this degree.
- 6. People that are interested in learning a new trade often choose this educational and training option. This type of post-
- G. On the Job Training secondary education combines on the job and the job and instruction. Many people who want to be welders, plumbers, and secondary education combines on the job training with classroom work with their hands often enter this type of program.
  - 7. People receive this type of training while they work. Most people that get entry level jobs and have little or no work experience are given this type of training to learn how to do a specific job.
  - 8. Many people choose to get this in order to prove that they are competent in their job. Several different occupations require that you have this in order to work. Obtaining this requires that you pass a test and pay a fee.
  - People often enlist in this organization to obtain specialized training in a certain field of interest and/or to receive help for funding their college education. Usually, you must have a high school diploma and be in good physical health to be considered for this training opportunity.
